## 4. Where Harris County Ranks

### AREA

Harris County covers a total of 1,777 square miles, enough space to fit the cities of New York, Philadelphia, Boston, Chicago, Seattle, Austin and Dallas, with room still to spare. (Texas Almanac; U.S. Census Bureau; GHP)

### POPULATION

With an estimated 4,589,928 residents as of July 1, 2016, Harris County is the most populous county in Texas and the third most populous county in the United States. (U.S. Census Bureau, July 1, 2016 Population Estimates, 03/17)

If it were a state, Harris County would have the 26th largest population in the U.S., behind Louisiana (4,681,666) and ahead of Kentucky (4,436,974) and Oregon (4,093,465). (U.S. Census Bureau, July 1, 2016 Population Estimates, 03/17; GHP)

By gaining 56,587 new residents from July 1, 2015 to July 1, 2016, Harris County experienced the second-highest numeric population increase among all U.S. counties. Prior to 2016, Harris County held the number one spot for new residents eight years in a row. (U.S. Census Bureau, July 1, 2016 Population Estimates, 03/17; GHP)

#### FOREIGN-BORN

25.4% of Harris County residents are foreign-born – slightly ahead of the 23.6% for the Houston metro area population and surpassing the 13.6% for the U.S. population. (U.S. Census Bureau, 2011-2015 American Community Survey 5-Year Estimates, 07/13/17)

### EMPLOYMENT

More than 2.2 million residents are employed in Harris County. If Harris County were a state, it would rank 28th in total employment among the U.S. states, with more jobs than South Carolina, Alabama, or Louisiana. (GHP)

### EXPORTS

With \$68.2 billion exported goods in 2016, Harris County was the largest single-county exporter in the U.S. and accounted for 81% of all goods exported from the Houston metro area. (U.S. International Trade Administration, 10/13/17)

### **GDP AND INCOMING INVESTMENTS**

Harris County ranks No. 1 in Texas and No. 2 in the nation in terms of GDP growth and ranks No. 4 in Texas and No. 9 in the nation for incoming investments. (SmartAsset.com, 2017 using U.S. Census Bureau County Business Patterns Survey, U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis, U.S. Census Bureau Building Permits Survey, Bloomberg) prepared 12/06/17 Page 6 of 43



## 5.3 One Stop Shop/<u>Business Resources</u> - Entrepreneur's Guide to Starting A Business

Step 1: Research your idea. Talk to your local chamber of commerce, <u>Houston Office of Business Opportunity</u> (832-393-0954), <u>US Small Business</u> <u>Administration</u> (Houston Office) (713-773-6500), or your local EDC or EDO. For Harris County Partners <u>click here</u>.

Step 2: If you determine that your business plan is viable, then look for a location. Would you qualify for special incentives? Will you need to hire a professional architect or engineer, submit a site plan to the zoning office or obtain special permits? For Harris County permits <u>click here</u> (713-274-3900). For city permits, please visit <u>their websites</u>.

Step 3: Name your business. Research other businesses that may have a similar name to the one you are considering. Check the availability of your name on the U.S. Patent website (800-786-9199) to see if it has been trademarked. If you plan on incorporating you'll need to file with the Texas Secretary of State (512-463-5555) to make sure that your name is not claimed already. For Harris County Assumed Business Names searches click on DBA or call 713-274-8600.

**Step 4:** Depending on what type of business entity you form, you may have to register with the <u>Texas Secretary of State</u>. Some of the more common forms are Sole Proprietorship, For Profit Corporation, Professional Corporation, Professional Association, General Partnership, Limited Partnership, Limited Liability Partnership and Limited Liability Company. Foreign and out-of-state entities also have to file an application for registration with the <u>Texas Secretary of State</u> in order to transact business in Texas. An Assumed Name or Doing Business As (DBA) Certificate with the County Clerk in the county(s) in which the business is located and/or will conduct business must be filed. See <u>Harris County Clerk's Office</u> (713-274-8600) for details.

Step 5: <u>Texas Business Organization Code</u> requires every business to maintain a registered agent and office in Texas. File this information with the <u>Texas</u> <u>Secretary of State</u>.

Step 6: Determine federal, state, and local tax obligations for your business. Apply for an Employer Identification number (EIN) with the <u>IRS</u> (800-829-4933). Determine sales, use and excise taxes. Apply for a Texas sales tax permit with the <u>Texas Comptroller</u> (888-334-4112). Property taxes are assessed by the <u>Harris County Appraisal District</u> (713-957-7800) and collected by the <u>Harris County Tax Office</u> (713-274-8000). The <u>Texas Workforce Commission</u> (TWC) (512-463-2222) requires most employers to pay an Unemployment Insurance tax. More information can be found at the TWC website.

Step 7: The state of Texas does not require a general business license, but you may be required to have a license or permit depending on the type of service, or products associated with your business. Specific professions that require state level licenses can be found at the <u>Texas Department of Licensing and</u> <u>Regulation (TDLR</u>) (512-463-6599). Also contact your county and city to determine if there are any additional requirements.






## **2016 Population - Ethnicity Distribution Chart** (Harris County)













## Harris County Education Attainment






